Foundation News

This term we are conducting our unit 'Amazing Animals' which has been designed to encourage our students to investigate the features animals have which enhance their survival. During Science investigations, our students will be encouraged to make predictions, to record their observations and to share their findings. We will be encouraging our students to become active learners who engage in experiments and participate in discussions.

There is no doubt excitement is building amongst our Foundation students, as they prepare to attend their first school excursion. We are going to the Royal Melbourne Zoo on Tuesday 7th May. The key understandings we will be reinforcing during our excursion and throughout our Science unit are:

- All living things grow, move and reproduce
- All living things including humans have basic needs for survival such as oxygen, water, food and shelter
- Living things have features and characteristics that help them survive

We are now implementing the Reading Workshop model, which reinforces reading strategies, comprehension and develops student's stamina to read independently. It is wonderful watching our students eagerly selecting their books from the book boxes and seeing them engaged in independent reading.

This term our students are exploring the difference between fiction and non-fiction books. Last week we began guided reading groups with the focus being one to one correspondence and using visual clues such as the initial letters and picture clues as well as prior knowledge to predict unknown words. While we work with guided reading groups, the remaining members of the class work independently to complete reading activities.

In Mathematics, we have introduced the days of the week and their order through songs. Our students have created a simple timetable linking school activities to specific days of the week. For instance, P.M.P is on Monday and on Thursday we do Japanese and PE. You can help at home by drawing your child's attention to the day of the week and highlighting the extra-curricular activities they do each day. Also highlight the specific time associated to activities they do daily, for example at 7am we have breakfast and at 4pm you go to swimming lessons. It is important students understand the order of events throughout the day and the times related to them to develop their understanding of the concept of time.

This week our students have worked cooperatively to create simple patterns using a range of concrete materials. They are currently exploring two and three part patterns related to colour, picture and shape patterns.










This week we began our P.M.P sessions thanks to our band of merry helpers who supervised the seven working stations. The aim of the program is to teach and develop the children's skills in the following areas: locomotion, balance, fitness, eye-hand co-ordination, body awareness, laterality, the development of memory and an understanding of location concepts. The launch of the program was a huge success and we know our students are looking forward to the next session.









Junior School

Year 1

This term Year 1 have begun a new Science focus on living things, needs and habitats. We will be linking this to an excursion in week 4 (Tues 14th May) to Healesville Sanctuary. We've made a great start to our learning by exploring our school grounds this week to find examples of living things. We talked about various insects, and researched earthworms. Some of us had a chance to start creating worms and caterpillars as an art activity.

In Literacy, Year 1 students have a new author to focus on. It's Eric Carle. We started with his most famous book The Very Hungry Caterpillar. Most of us were familiar with this story and loved joining in and predicting what would happen next.

In Maths, we have been continuing our work on addition and subtraction. We are developing our skills of using number lines as well as discussing other strategies to help us work out addition and





subtraction worded problems. It would be great if you could support their learning of this tricky concept by harnessing opportunities to add and subtract when they arise at home, i.e. counting money, objects, using cooking opportunities.

Year 2

In Year 2 we are also studying information reports, focusing on how facts are organised, how to use contents, index and glossary pages and how to learn new information from photos and diagrams. We are working on broadening students' understanding of information reports by reading about topics other than animals. So far we have read a lot about the earth, different countries and space. Students are beginning to use their choice writing time to write their own information reports on topics they have expertise in. It is very exciting to see students independently writing reports on space, their pets and their favourite sports. In the latter half of this unit students will be organised into groups with similar interests, and will be taught how to research and record new information. This research task will be the basis for their final information reports. We will share more about this in the next newsletter.

In Maths, Year 2 students have been learning about money. They have learnt to skip count coins to find amounts, and have started learning to calculate the total of small handfuls of mixed coins. Students have enjoyed the hands on tasks in this unit, and have enjoyed taking on the roles of 'cashier' and 'shopper' to practise.

We have also started a new Science topic – life cycles. Students have started to grow beans in the classroom, and will be investigating the life cycles of many different animals and plants. We have an exciting excursion coming up to support our learning in this area – a trip to Healesville Sanctuary!



Middle School

Welcome back to Term 2. We hope you all had a nice and relaxing break

This term, the Years 3 and 5 students will be completing NAPLAN. The assessments are undertaken nationwide every year and the NAPLAN window will be open from 14th-24th May.

NAPLAN is made up of tests in four areas:

- Reading
- Writing
- Language Conventions (spelling, grammar and punctuation)
- Numeracy.

NAPLAN tests skills in literacy and numeracy that are developed over time, through the school curriculum. All tests will be completed online except for the Year 3 writing task.

Students in Years 3-6 enjoyed participating in House Athletics today. Great sportsmanship was demonstrated by students in different year levels and houses, with plenty of cheering and celebrating of one another's achievements. It was amazing to see everyone join in and challenge themselves, especially the Year Three students who were competing for the first time.

Year 3 students have been given their first Homework Grid for the year. Both the Year 3 and 4 students will be given homework on a Tuesday each week to be completed and returned by the following Monday. Students are also expected to continue to practice their nightly reading and spelling.

Film Club began this week and the selected Middle and Senior school students gathered to begin learning about filming. Students are eager to develop their skills in filming for the Ruskin Reporting group and Personal Best Ambassadors group.

Senior School

Welcome

Welcome back and we hope you enjoyed your Easter break. We have an action packed Term 2 in the Senior School with much learning to be done and many activities to be enjoyed. We look forward to a fabulous term of learning in the Senior School.

Earth and Space Science

This term our STEM unit focuses on Earth and Space Science. Students will explore earth and it being part of a system of planets orbiting around a star (the sun). They will inquire about the characteristics of different planets and compare them to earth. In week three students will participate in an incursion named the Science Discovery Dome. Furthermore, students will explore sudden geological changes or extreme weather conditions that affect the Earth's surface, such as earthquakes and volcanoes.

Health

This term Year 5 and 6 students will investigate areas around personal and social health. To complement this students are invited to attend sessions conducted by Interrelate - Moving into Teens. Families can pay and give consent online via Compass.

Transition

Year 6 to Year 7 transition forms have now been distributed to all Year 6 students. We encourage parents and students to attend Open Nights and Secondary School tours to help them make this important decision. Transition

forms are due back to school no later than **Friday 17**th **May.** Included in the pack was a Frequently Asked Questions leaflet which strives to answer most of your questions. If you are experiencing difficulty completing these forms or need some assistance please don't hesitate to contact Mrs. Pratley, Miss. Marshall or Mr. Coffin.

Winter Interschool Sports

Next week our Year 6 students and selected Year 5 students will participate in Round One of the Winter Interschool Sports Competition. Winter sports included this year are: Football, Soccer, Netball and Newcomb. We will be traveling to Mount Evelyn Primary School to play. Parents are encouraged to come and support their children. Students are reminded to wear their sports tops (if they have one) and appropriate footwear.

Numeracy at Ruskin Park

According to Peter Sullivan (Open-Ended Maths Activities, 2018) closed questions are those that simply require an answer or a response to be given from memory, such as a description of a situation or object or the reproduction of a skill. Open questions are those that require a student to think more deeply and to give a response which involves more than recalling fact or reproducing a skill. Questions which encourage students to do more than recall known facts have the potential to stimulate high levels of thinking.

So here is a question which will have multiple answers. How many can you think of? Let your teacher know.

Question: What do these numbers have in common? 30 12 18

Japanese Day

On Wednesday, May 29 we will be having a Japanese Day at Ruskin Park Primary School.

Normal classes will not be running and for the entire day students will take part in Japanese cultural activities.

We are inviting students to dress up in something 'Japanese' so please give some thought to what your child might wear on the day. We will be starting the day with a costume parade in the gym, which parents are invited to attend. There will be some small prizes given to the best Japanese costumes.

All students will rotate through four different cultural activities. These activities will include fan making, origami helmets and every class will have one special activity which will include, sumo wrestling, karate, manga drawing, character bento making or rice-ball making.

The day will conclude with a Karate demonstration in the gym.

We will be charging \$8 per student to help cover the costs of materials and incursions.
