#### **Foundation**

Half way through the year and we are so impressed with our students. We would like to congratulate all the Foundation students on their achievements this term. It has been a busy term with many extra activities such as PMP, Zoo excursion, Education Week and open afternoons. Writing reports have given us an opportunity to reflect on the past semester with joy and great pride. Teachers have enjoyed seeing their students' wonderful achievements and growth.

#### Literacy

In Reading, we have continued our focus on nonfiction texts. We are continuously recapping the differences between fiction and nonfiction books, and some of the features that we might see like headings, photographs, labels, and diagrams. Students have been exposed to a variety of nonfiction texts and have worked on their comprehension by recalling four or more facts that they remember. If you have any nonfiction texts at home, it would be great for you to explore them with your child!





Students have absolutely loved Writing so far this term. The Foundation students have explored a variety of animals and insects and have learnt lots of new information about them. Last week, students got to put on their scientists' hats and observe, predict, and pose questions about interesting plant facts. Students worked hard to draw and label their plant observations, write various interesting facts about them, and write questions about what they wanted to know more about! We couldn't wait to research the answers to their questions and share our findings!

#### Maths

Over the last two weeks we have focused on addition for our Maths work. Students have been exploring strategies such as count all, counting on, using hands-on materials (counters and blocks) and 10s frames to assist in problem solving. Students have learned games using decks of cards and dice! Challenge your child at home to add toys, fruit or cutlery... Maths opportunities are everywhere!



## **Amazing Animals!**

Foundation students have been hard at work creating their Amazing Animals Project. Students were challenged to design and create an animal and its habitat and the results have been remarkable. We will be sending home a presentation template for students to complete, so keep a lookout in your child's reader folder!









To further explore our science topic on living things, students have been planting seeds and predicting what and how they will grow. We are also investigating their needs for survival and observing any changes that occur in the process of caring for the seeds.

#### **Zoo Excursion**

Last week we had a day at Melbourne Zoo. The rain held off and the Foundation students were able to enjoy the excursion. We keenly observed the animals, their habitats and we showed good focusing skills as we experienced the zoo and in our Wildlife Explorer's session. Here are a few photos of the day.

#### **Junior School**

#### Year 1

It has been a jam packed term full of learning and excitement! We have had some wonderful experiences such as our Healesville Sanctuary Excursion, Education Week and the whole school athletics day, just to name a few. We are really looking forward to our school disco next Thursday. We hope the students have their dancing shoes ready to rock and roll! Just a reminder that it will be a 2:30 pm dismissal on the last day of Term 2 (23rd of June).

We can't believe that this term is coming to an end. We hope that you all have an amazing break and we look forward to seeing all the smiling faces returning for Term 3.

#### Wellbeing

You may have heard the words 'Friendship Ninja' being mentioned at home. It is something exciting that we have begun to explore during our Wellbeing sessions! The students have started to learn about 'Friendology' and the fact that in order to create healthy friendships, we need to first look inward and treat ourselves like a new best friend. We have been discovering our 'inner ninja' and exploring different ways that we can be kind to ourselves and others.












We have also been learning about personal strengths. The students were supported to identify three of their top personal strengths and discuss how they demonstrate their strengths to others. We discussed how students might use their strengths to be a good friend and family member. You might like to talk to your child at home about what their strengths are and how they are being a best friend to themselves.

#### Literacy

In Literacy we have been reading familiar texts such as 'The Very Cranky Bear' by Nick Bland and 'Pig the Pug' by Aaron Blabey. The students have been learning about what constitutes a narrative and what essential elements are included. The students have enjoyed finding and recording the OOH (interesting character/s), AHH (descriptive setting), UH-OH (exciting problem) and PHEW (solution).

Using familiar texts by Nick Bland and Aaron Blabey, students have had the opportunity to write amazing retells that include a little twist! Our stories started the same but had one or two elements that were different. It may have been a different solution, a different problem or even a character that has different inside character traits. We can't wait to publish some of our wonderful stories!

Our phonics focus has included final 'n' blends such as '-nd', '-nt' and 'nk'. When reading with your child at home, see if you can spot some of our focus blends in the take home readers! Some examples are below.



#### Maths

In Maths, we have been exploring data and graphing. The students had multiple opportunities to collect and represent data using a range of materials and in a variety of ways. We discussed questions that could be answered using data and some students were even able to create their own questions that could be answered using the graph that they created. Check out some of the amazing data collections that the students came up with below!







This week we have begun to explore addition and subtraction. The students were taught 'The Sum Game' where they were able to practise and develop their understanding of addition and had the opportunity to explain their thinking and strategies used. We started to explore how to create different numbers using a range of strategies and concrete materials.





#### Year 2

We have had so much fun in Year 2 this term! We have been incredibly impressed by the wonderful thinking and learning our students have been showing us. Thank you to our families for all your support with your continued commitment to home reading and consolidating our learning through spelling and maths homework.

A reminder that there will be no formal homework in the final week of term, however please continue to read with your child each day.

Here are some of the things we have been learning at school.

#### Literacy

We have been exploring poetry over the last two weeks in both Reading and Writing and students have enjoyed looking at chants, such as 'A Pizza Hut' (which many families might be familiar with!). In Reading, we have been looking at identifying and recording the number of syllables in each line of a poem. We have also been identifying interesting words that authors use. We are now beginning to look at parts of speech, such as nouns, verbs and adjectives, and use them in our writing. In Writing, students have enjoyed writing their own 'Syllable Poems', which have the same number of syllables per line. We have also enjoyed writing and publishing a variety of poems in both written and digital forms.

In Spelling, we have continued to focus on double consonants after a short vowel sound and have looked at the spelling rules when adding suffixes such as -ed, -ing and -er. Students have enjoyed investigating spelling rules and writing both real and nonsense words based on these rules.









#### Maths

In Year 2 we have absolutely loved learning about money! Students have explored Australian coins and notes, learning different ways to count money and how to show the same amount of money in different ways. We have been blown away by the thinking our students have shown, and how they have explained their ideas and used their problems solving skills throughout this unit. They have shown different ways to record their thinking, such as using tables or pictures. Students have been earning 'pocket money' for their tables and have delighted in counting it regularly and deciding on ways to spend it in the classroom.

This week we are beginning to explore 2D shapes and students have been busy studying regular and irregular shapes and looking at their sides and corners to determine the names of each shape. They have explored and sorted a range of 2D shapes thinking about and describing their properties.







#### Wellbeing

In Wellbeing, we have continued to focus on resilience and working as a team. We have been practicing being resilient throughout our daily learning and working as a team through lots of fun games and stories. Students enjoyed holding hands in a circle and trying to pass a hula hoop around the circle without letting go of hands. It was delightful to hear the positive words of encouragement the students offered to each other throughout these activities.

We have also been discussing individual preferences, how we are all different, and how both boys and girls can enjoy doing different things.

#### Geography

In Geography, students continued to learn about and identify continents and oceans. We are beginning to think about the connections that we have to different places within Australia and around the world and have had lots of fun asking and researching questions about different places. Please remember to talk with your child about any connections that they may have to different places around the world.



### Middle School

#### Year 3

#### **Imax and Melbourne Museum Excursion**

On Tuesday, our Year 3 students embarked on an incredible adventure to IMAX and the Melbourne Museum. They were treated to a captivating 3D documentary called "The Great Barrier Reef," which perfectly complemented their recent unit on Information Reports, where they delved into the fascinating world of Australian landmarks. The students thoroughly enjoyed immersing themselves in the documentary and were truly inspired by the wonders of the Great Barrier Reef. Following the film, they had the opportunity to explore the museum's diverse exhibits, further enriching their learning experience. It was a day filled with excitement, discovery, and a deeper appreciation for our country's remarkable heritage.





















#### **Money Unit**

We have started learning about Australian money this term. Our Year 3 students have had a blast participating in a thrilling Money Bags scavenger hunt, where they've been tasked with adding up various collections of coins and notes. In addition, they've acquired valuable skills in adding supermarket products using dollars and cents, while also applying their understanding of the split strategy. Building on this foundation, our upcoming week holds another exciting activity as we set up a shop featuring a range of supermarket products. This hands-on experience will provide our students with the opportunity to learn about giving and receiving change.








#### **Dreamtime Stories**

We have been reading lots of Dreamtime Stories and learning about messages and morals. Students discovered invaluable life lessons, including the importance of not being greedy, listening to warnings and respecting the land we live on. Year 3's have been inspired by these teachings, and our students have been hard at work, diligently drafting and publishing their own stories, each with a moral. Here are some wonderful front covers. We eagerly await the final masterpieces and are excited to share them with other classes and celebrate the creativity and wisdom of our Year 3 cohort.







#### Year 4

It is hard to believe that we have just one more week left of term. It has been a busy couple of weeks in Year Four.

#### Literacy

We have recently finished creating our engaging and lively book talks and presented them as a class for feedback! It was wonderful to see the dedication and variety of engaging features that students implemented into their book talk presentations. In Reading, students have moved into our Dreamtime unit, in which we have read and listened to a variety of stories created by Gregg Dreise. Through this, students learnt about the value and importance of our Acknowledgements to Country and developed their understanding of the land we are so fortunate to live and learn on. Students have continued to explore some Dreamtime stories by analysing texts for their purpose, theme and moral.

In Writing, students had the opportunity to use their wonderful ideas in their Writer's Notebook to create a narrative writing piece. Students explored how they could create interesting and lively sentence starters to hook readers into their writing, as well as using descriptive language and connectives to link ideas together. Further to this, students explored how to accurately structure quotation marks in their writing to clearly identify character dialogue.

#### **Numeracy**

In Mathematics, students have continued to develop their knowledge of addition, subtraction and financial mathematics. Students were introduced to the game of 100 Laughs which they loved. We encourage you to ask your child how to play our fun game at home! Additionally, students explored investigations such as planning a day of fun at Leisure Land and building a new city. These investigations challenged students to plan events using a timeline, as well as outlining key expenses within the investigations and ensuring that they don't go over budget. Students have now moved into exploring transformations such as flips, slides and turns using 2D shapes, as well as creating their tessellations using their own shapes and imagination!









#### Wellbeing

We have enjoyed learning and exploring more about our school value of Respect. Students have worked hard on identifying what respect looks like, sounds like, and feels like in a variety of contexts, such as in the classroom, the school yard and at home. In this, students have done a wonderful job of creating respect pledges that show how they will demonstrate what respect looks, sounds, and feels like. We will be reflecting on these pledges next week to see if we have accomplished them. Students also explored the 3 C's that underpin respect- Caring, Courtesy and Consideration.

A special congratulations to the boys' soccer team which has progressed to Division after winning its grand final.












#### Year 5

Another 2 weeks have flown by, filled with lots of learning and growing. This week, we had an exciting opportunity to host a documentary screening, with some special guests joining us to view a few examples from each class. We are so proud of the work our students put in to create their documentaries and enjoyed showcasing some for our school leaders to see.




#### **Reading and Writing**

We have continued learning about poetry in Reading and Writing. We explored various poetic devices including rhyme, rhythm, figurative language, alliteration, sound and enjambment (where a sentence intentionally continues over a line). We've read and analysed several poems, including various shape poems and odes, and discussed our thoughts about the poem. We've enjoyed the creativity of writing our own poems, which although often short, are harder than they first appear. Here are some examples of shape poems, where the shape of the poem reflects the message or topic of the poem.







#### Maths

Over the past fortnight, we have been learning about patterns and algebra. Learning about algebra at first can be intimidating, but we practised using all the number clues in an equation to help solve the unknown quantities, or to balance an equation. Learning about patterns is a lot of fun, and at this level, their learning extends beyond creative patterns, to identifying and explaining the rules of growing patterns.

#### Year 5 Camp

We are very excited to have this event confirmed for Term 3, Week 7, August 23-25. Our camp to Sovereign Hill complements our History unit, where students will be learning about the colonisation of Australia, including the Gold Rush. It will be a great opportunity for students to immerse themselves in the time period of the Gold Rush through the Sovereign Hill Living Museum. As well as exploring the various places at Sovereign Hill, we will also be attending the Aura Sound and Light show and a Pantomime show. The event is published on Compass for parents/guardians to provide consent and payment.

#### Year 6

#### **Year Six Warrnambool Tour**

This is a friendly reminder that payment and consent for the Year Six Warrnambool Tour is due on Wednesday 21<sup>st</sup> June. You may choose to complete the payment in one transaction or pay half now and half next term. The camp will occur in Term Three, from Monday 4<sup>th</sup> September to Wednesday 6<sup>th</sup> September. We have many exciting activities locked in for the Year Six cohort, including visiting the Flagstaff Hill Maritime Museum and visiting the 12 Apostles. More information including 'what to bring' and medical forms will be distributed early Term Three. If you have any questions, please don't hesitate to contact your child's classroom teacher.

#### Mathematics

In Mathematics, students have continued working through the Statistics unit. In the past fortnight students have developed their skills in identifying the mode, median, range and mean of data sets. Students have continued to develop their skills in developing stem and leaf plots and calculating mode, median, range and mean from these data sets.

We have continued to perform a range of problem solving lessons across the unit, encouraging students to think deeply about their Maths and enter the 'zone of confusion'. Students have been encouraged to use a Growth Mindset when initially the task may seem difficult and approach the question using different strategies and using resources to support them. They have been encouraged to look for patterns in their data and to represent their findings in a method that is easy to communicate to their peers.

#### Literacy

In Reading, we have been continuing our author study on Shaun Tan. Students have studied a range of his famous picture books including Cicada, The Red Tree, The Rabbits and Rules of Summer. The past fortnight students have been studying the illustrations in Shaun Tan's texts and the link with the words used. They have carefully analysed the illustrations, noting the mood, the colours used, the faces of characters, etc.

Furthermore, students have compared and contrasted Shaun Tan's texts, identifying similarities between illustrations, themes, mood, etc. Students selected their two favourite Shaun Tan texts and carefully analysed the illustrations, symbolism and themes between the books, carefully explaining this in their Reader's Notebooks using evidence from the text, with some students creating Venn diagrams to display their thinking.

Students were also introduced to a new Shaun Tan text, 'Eric' which contained deep themes and again used symbolism. Students were required to infer, reading between the lines and using the illustrations provided to help them explain what happened to Eric.

In Writing, we have been developing students' skills in essay writing. Students are responding to the statement — 'Shaun Tan's Illustrations Say A Lot'. They are using evidence from Shaun Tan's famous picture books to support the essay statement. Students have selected which books they'd like to discuss in their essay and furthermore select specific illustrations, themes, symbols, moods, tone, etc. to explain that Shaun Tan's illustrations say a lot. Students are writing their essay using the TEEL structure — topic sentence, explanation, evidence and link. We look forward to sharing these essays with you all.

#### **Other News**

#### 2023 International Competitions and Assessments for Schools (ICAS)

Ruskin Park Primary School is once again providing students in Years 3 – 6 an opportunity to take part in ICAS. These assessments are designed to recognise excellence for high potential students. Assessments are available in Digital Technologies, English, Mathematics, Science, and Spelling. The assessments are conducted online at school. All participating students will receive a general overview of their performance. If you would like your child to take part in ICAS you will need to complete registration online by **Friday 21**st **July.** Participation in ICAS is a parent choice and not compulsory. Please note the Year 5s will be on camp during the Spelling and Science assessment week.
