Reading

Reading rich texts to young children is a powerful way to ignite a love of reading and foster deep connections to stories, language, and ideas. Rich texts are texts with vivid language, meaningful themes, and engaging narratives. We want to encourage students to see reading as a joyful, meaningful activity and lay the foundation for a lifelong relationship with books and storytelling. This week, we have focused on a variety of texts to deepen thinking and connections! After reading, students have been practising important comprehension skills by discussing texts together. Students have been making connections between different stories, visualising scenes in their minds, and predicting what might happen next. These activities help deepen their understanding and enjoyment of the books they read.







Writing

Maths

Foundation students have been learning and revising important skills in collecting, sorting, and comparing data. They practised interpreting information and representing it visually by creating picture graphs. As they work through these tasks, they are becoming more independent and confident in handling data on their own.





Literacy

In Literacy, we have begun our unit on reading and writing poetry. So far, we have looked at rhyming words and how they do not necessarily have to have the same spelling pattern; it is all about the ending sound. Students have been writing their own rhyming couplet poems, focusing on specific sounds and familiar poems, using their own ideas. We have been discussing why authors write poems and what features a poem has. The students have been focusing on rhythm and rhyme when reading a poem and demonstrating expression and intonation when reading aloud. Encourage your child to practise rhyming words at home! How many rhyming words can you make? This week, our students have been practising the skill of visualisation. We read a poem together, and the children used the clues and word choices to create their own illustrations of what they imagined. It was wonderful to see how each student's picture captured a different interpretation of the poem!











Maths

Last week, students revisited data and graphing. They enjoyed collecting their own data on a variety of topics and represented it using pictographs. From there, students explored different types of tables and graphs, learning how to interpret the information and answer related questions. This hands-on approach helped students see how data can be organised and used to tell us more about the world around us.





This week we have been learning to make equal groups with and without concrete materials. Our focus has been on equal sharing of numbers and being able to show our thinking in various ways through open-ended tasks. We have been challenging ourselves by using key vocabulary when explaining our thinking about what equal sharing is. We loved using the concrete materials around our classrooms when making equal groups. Can you think of a time when you would need to make an equal share? Why is it important to make a fair share?

Year 2

As the term draws to a close, we have enjoyed some very exciting events.

The **Tony Bones incursion** was a highlight, with students amazed and entertained by the fabulous retelling of *General Waste*. The interactive performance had everyone dancing, laughing, and fully engaged — and it was still the talk of the classroom later that day!













Another memorable event was our **swimming program**. Students not only developed their swimming skills but also learned to take responsibility for their belongings and move safely between the bus and the pool. It was a big week, and we were so proud of the way they gave their best effort each day.




















Literacy

This week, our Year 2 students have been diving into the world of poetry. They have been learning how poems can come alive through rhythm, by listening to and counting syllables in each line. Students also explored how structure makes a poem work, using a mix of nouns, verbs, and adjectives to bring their ideas to life.



Through reading and writing their own poems, Year 2 students have discovered how language choices and word patterns can create mood, rhythm, and meaning. The students have enjoyed experimenting with playful words, building their vocabulary, and sharing their creative work.





Maths

Year 2 students have been exploring the exciting world of multiplication and division. Students are learning to build their understanding by using pictures to represent equal groups, writing repeated addition number sentences, and connecting these skills to multiplication equations.

Through these activities, students are developing strong visual and number skills to help them see the connections between addition and multiplication.

It has been wonderful to watch their confidence grow as they work with numbers in new and challenging ways.









Middle School

Year 3

Tony Bones

Year 3 students were treated to a great performance by Tony Bones. This was centred around the book *General Waste*. This performance was thoroughly enjoyed by all students and demonstrated the power of performance in helping them understand topics referenced in books.





Swimming

Year 3 has had a blast at swimming this week! It has been great to see everyone learning essential water safety skills and using their knowledge of the school value of respect to listen to the instructors, while also having fun in the process. Students have been very organised and have shown growing maturity and responsibility in keeping their things organised and safe. Well done, Year 3!










Literacy

In both Reading and Writing, we have begun looking at poetry and its variety of forms as a way to engage readers. Students have explored 'rhyming couplets', a technique of creating a piece of writing with two lines in a row that rhyme, and 'Cinquain poems', which use the 2-4-6-8-2 syllable pattern. Students have been showing their ability to become poets though the exploration of poetry and showing they are using the concepts they have learnt to create impressive and expressive poems for others to read. Poetry will be the focus in literacy for the rest of the term, and students will continue to endeavour to create their own unique and wonderful poems.

Maths

Last week in Maths, Year 3 focused on capacity and discussing what capacity actually is and how to measure it. Throughout the week, all three Year 3 classes used a variety of containers and materials to measure the capacity of different-sized jugs and cups. Students learnt how to measure using millilitres and also convert millilitres into litres. There has also been a focus on 2D shapes, specifically on how to identify shapes by their number of sides and angles. They have enjoyed using a variety of materials and resources to explore these two areas of Maths!







History

In History, students researched and created a poster to show important information about a day of celebration or commemoration in Australia. They focused on making their posters informative and appealing through organising the information. These were then presented to the class, developing students' confidence, presentation skills and the ability to teach others new things. It has been great seeing everyone's confidence grow!







Wellbeing

In Wellbeing, we have been completing an 'Identity Wheel' to help think about who we actually are. Students have drawn and written about the activities they enjoy doing





with their time in various situations, as illustrated in the wheel. This task has helped develop a further sense of self and identify ways each student can make themselves feel better.

DigiTech

In DigiTech this week, Year 3 has been exploring the uses for AI and how it works. This week's task involved the three classes exploring how AI distinguishes between objects, specifically examining its ability to identify sharks (instead of dolphins) to help keep people safe at the beach and further exploring this ability to recognise items using 'AutoDraw', which is a predictive drawing website that can guess what students are drawing and create a perfect drawing for them. Students were engaged and interested in this amazing technology, recognising that AI uses shapes to work these problems out!

Year 4

What an amazing term we have had!

Term Three brought many fantastic opportunities, including Parent-Teacher Interviews, STEM Open Night, Swimming, Book Week, the Books to Life incursion, the Father's Day Stall, District and Division Athletics, and, to wrap it all up, we are looking forward to Footy Day on the final day of term.





Literacy

Having concluded our David Walliams author study, we are now focusing on reading and writing poetry. Students each have their own poetry anthology folder, which they add to daily with a wide variety of poetry styles to read and enjoy. They are identifying how the literary devices of onomatopoeia, alliteration, simile, metaphor, and repetition are used in poetry to express big ideas with few words. These 'tools' are being applied as students create their own free-verse poetry, exploring both positive and negative emotions.

The Year 4 students have been challenged to take their brainstorming to the next level by making associations between strong emotions and the world around them, producing powerful poetic language. Next week, students will plan, draft, and publish Colour Poems, connecting language to their five senses. We can't wait to see the rich language and imagery they create.





Numeracy

What are the chances of the students beating their teachers in maths games over the last two weeks of term? It's highly likely, as we wrap up Term Three with an exploration of chance and probability!

Students have been describing everyday events in terms of likelihood and creating a 'probability scale' for reference. They are investigating possible outcomes of chance experiments and identifying independent and dependent events. They are also ordering outcomes by likelihood, conducting repeated chance experiments, and exploring patterns and variation in results. In our class discussions, students explain and justify the likelihood of outcomes while describing the relationships and variations observed in their experiments.





Year 4 Camp – Gundiwindi

Students are getting very excited about camp as we begin discussing plans with them. Please make sure you have checked the Compass event and keep an eye out for forms coming home to be completed.

Literacy

In Reading, the Year 5 students have been analysing a range of speeches. We have watched several engaging speeches by interesting people, such as Kid President, Greta Thunberg, Michelle Obama, Emma Watson, and a Ted Talk by a young boy named Cole Blakeway, who spoke about why it's so great to be different. Students analysed these speeches for a range of techniques including tone, expression, pace and posture. Students commented on what they liked about the speeches and how each person made their speech engaging.

Students have begun drafting their captaincy speeches for Term 4. All students are encouraged to reflect on their personal strengths, consider their contributions to Ruskin Park over the years, and think about how they can support Ruskin in the future.



Maths

In Maths, we finished off our pattern's unit. Students explored some different puzzles to help them better understand algebraic equations. They were able to demonstrate how the pattern continues once you know one of the numbers.

This week, we have started exploring perimeter and area. Through completing a range of hands-on tasks, students have been able to apply their knowledge to measure a variety of objects.

Year 6

Camp

While away at camp, students will be participating in a range of activities and challenges that promote sportsmanship, team building, teamwork, leadership, cooperation and support. Last week, students had the amazing opportunity to paint part of the mural at the front of the school. The artwork of the mural had design input from our Year 6s earlier in the year. It's exciting to see the mural go from a concept to a work in progress and soon to be a completed project.







English

The Year 6 students greatly enjoyed the engaging and creative performance of 'General Waste' for this year's Book Week incursion. It was a joy to see them dancing along and laughing as Tony Bones brought the book to life, with the help of some fantastic volunteers from the crowd! Within the classroom, it's been wonderful to hear students making connections to themes of sustainability and the environment.



We have continued our journey into the world of poetry in both Reading and Writing by enjoying and analysing light-hearted limericks and beautiful ballads. This dive into poetry analysis includes exploring a poet's writing choices and the effects on the reader. Students have been developing their skills in analysing poetry using the 'SMILE' format (Structure, Meaning, Imagery, Language and Effect) to help build comprehension around the elements within a poem.

In Writing, students have been eagerly brainstorming, planning and drafting their own limericks and ballads. Sharing their limericks and ballads with a few giggles here and there has been a highlight this fortnight in our Writing classes. It has been wonderful to see students express themselves with creativity.

Maths

The last two weeks have been all about number properties and order of operations.

Students have worked on many activities where they have determined the various properties of numbers, such as prime, composite, square and the factors and multiples of given numbers. Students have applied this understanding to solve various mixed operations, following the rules of BIDMAS to achieve correct solutions. It's great to see students' confidence and proficiency improve over the two weeks.

Physical Education

Every student gave their best effort and showed great sportsmanship throughout the day. Maths

This week, eight lucky students from Year 5 engaged in a Maths Game day hosted by Andrew Lorimer.

The students worked in teams of four to play a range of maths-based games and activities. They had a fantastic day playing games, learning new concepts, developing their teamwork skills, and creating new connections in mathematical thinking. Japanese

During Term Three, the **Foundation** students have continued to build on their understanding of Japanese numbers and learned kanji numbers to 20. They have been introduced to elements of Japanese culture such as Tanabata (The Star Festival) and Obon (The Festival of the Dead), Japanese traditional toys such as kamifusen and otedama and Bon Odori (Bon dancing). The Foundation students also listened to a number of Japanese stories, including: The Princess and the Herdboy, Issun Boushi, Urashima Taro and How the Old Man Lost His Wen. They learned how to count people, the names of family members and sang 'The Family Song'. The Foundation students also learned how to ask and answer questions about names.







The **Year 1** students learnt about the Tanabata festival and made some origami lanterns. They also learnt about Japanese money and tried some simple shopping conversations. The Year 1 students learnt how to talk about things they like and things they don't like. They also learned about 'my' things, pets, family, etc.







The **Year 2** students have begun to combine hiragana to make common words and include these words in sentences such as "Kore wa neko desu" (This is a cat). They learnt to ask, "How are you?" in Japanese and to respond with different answers. The Year 2 students learned about the three ways of writing in Japanese, hiragana, katakana and kanji. They organised their Japanese books into different sections and completed a Japanese-themed book cover. They also completed an origami 'kabuto' (samurai helmet), drew themselves wearing the helmet and labelled the body parts in Japanese.

The **Year 3, 4, 5** and **6** students have been learning about positional words such as up, down, left, right, front, back, inside and using these words in sentences to describe where things and people are. They also wrote sentences describing these positions, including places within a town.

They also learnt to ask and answer about time in Japanese. The Year 3 and 4 students made an origami flapping crane, and the Year 5 and 6 students made a traditional origami crane.







Music

Our youngest students shone brightly on stage, sharing a variety of performances that highlighted their talents and hard work. The concert featured xylophone playing, bucket drumming, dancing, singing, and even a special instrumental performance - each item bringing smiles and applause from our packed audience.

A huge thank you goes to all the parents and families who came along and filled the gym with such a supportive atmosphere. We are also grateful to the class teachers and specialist team for their guidance and encouragement. Most importantly, congratulations to our students, who performed so beautifully and made the afternoon such a memorable celebration of music and creativity.

Foundation

It has been a busy and exciting term in Foundation! Our students have been developing their performance and instrumental skills, focusing on projecting their singing voices and singing in rounds. They have also enjoyed practising playing together in groups, honing their listening skills, and learning the technical aspects of instruments such as the ukulele, xylophone, and bucket drums.

Year 1

This term in Music, our Year 1 students have been busy rehearsing and refining their class performances for the Kids on Parade Concert. Along the way, they learned valuable stagecraft skills - how to engage an audience, listen carefully, and work together to create a clear and confident sound.

In addition to music-making, students were introduced to elements of Drama. Through fun activities, they explored movement, actions, and expressions to bring different characters to life. It has been a creative and exciting term, and we are so proud of the effort and enthusiasm Year 1 students have shown in developing their performance skills.

Year 2

Year 2 students have been enthusiastically preparing for Kids on Parade this term. Each class worked diligently to arrange their performance pieces, including creating complementary two-part melodies on the xylophones, practising strumming patterns on the ukulele, exploring vocal techniques for singing, and developing rhythm and body percussion patterns using djembes.

In addition to instrumental work, we have focused on singing skills. The students have been practising matching pitch and performing in two- and three-part rounds. This requires careful listening and teamwork to produce a clear and confident sound.

Year 3 and 4

Year 3 and 4 students have had a busy term learning about the elements of dance and drama. They started by learning the steps to the line dance *The Boot Scootin Boogie* before creating and performing their own dance moves for the class.

In the second half of the term, the focus shifted to character creation. Students practised using facial expressions, gestures, posture, and voice to develop and show character status. Next term, they will build on these skills by exploring scripts and discovering how to bring characters to life on stage.





Year 5

Year 5 students have had a busy and creative term in Music. Using the xylophones, they explored how songs can be arranged and performed as a whole class item. Along the way, they developed their technique, rhythm, and listening skills to ensure they played together as an ensemble. Students also had the chance to step into the role of conductor, leading their classmates in performing their own arrangements - a fantastic way to build confidence and leadership skills.

In addition to xylophones, Year 5 worked with percussion instruments and bucket drums, arranging and composing their own rhythm patterns for the class to play. It has been wonderful to see their creativity and teamwork shine through in each performance.

Year 6

This term in Music, our Year 6 students have been fine-tuning their ensemble skills through a variety of performance and composition activities. On the xylophones, they learned how to arrange and perform pieces together, focusing on precision in technique and rhythm, while also listening closely to each other to create a polished group sound. A highlight was when students designed their own musical arrangements and then conducted the class - an excellent opportunity to showcase both creativity and leadership.

Students also worked with percussion and bucket drums, creating layered rhythm patterns and performing them as a class percussion piece. Another exciting part of the program was being introduced to GarageBand. Students explored the basics of the software and began experimenting with sound, setting the stage for next term when they will learn to develop their own beats, chord progressions, and songs.


